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

July 8 Picnic at Brown County State Park, Stahl Lake Shelter (Sutton, Diehn)

Join us at our annual Brown County picnic at the Shahl Lake Shelter. Recall this location has paved parking, sidewalks, and most important, flushing toilets and sinks with running water. Take the route to the fire tower and proceed another mile or so and you will see a sign on the left for Strahl

lake. The shelter is another 2 or 3 miles on your right. <u>Bring a covered dish; either a side dish or</u> <u>dessert.</u> The club will provide fried chicken and drinks. We will eat at 12:00. Bring a folding chair for your comfort. We will have corn hole setup as well.

July 15 Historic Vernon, Tunnel Mill, and James Covered Bridge, Vernon, IN (Meyer)

The tour begins at 9am at the Jennings Co. Historical Society building (built in 1838 as a stagecoach stop/ hotel) at the corner of Pike St. & Brown St, which is also at the North/East corner of the courthouse square (134 E. Brown St, Vernon). So, you'll need to make arrangements and "buddy up" and create small tour groups with other "A" participants in your area to arrive there by 9am. You could also plan to come earlier and have breakfast at Linda's Log Cabin Inn which is a block & ½ walk away, and they open at 7am. At 9am, we'll enter the J.C.H.S. building, and listen to several local historians talk, share stories, historical facts and "Firsts" about Vernon, including Tunnel Mill (built in 1824). At 10am, we'll hop into our "As" (LOL), and be guided to the Baldwin Cemetery, about a mile outside of town, where Dennis will talk about an event that happened there in 1964, and again in 1974. Then, for those who are agile & ready for a "moderate" ¼ mile trail hike, we'll head toward the Tunnel Mill ruins. And for the spelunkers in the group, we'll continue the through the 250 foot long tunnel, so bring a flash light. At 11:30ish we'll get back into our "As" and take a drive back to town and drive through the city Cemetery and continue on for an 18 mile jaunt to, and through, the James Covered Bridge, through Jennings Co. country, and on to Linda's Log Cabin Inn for Lunch around 1pm. We will head back to Salem for lunch at Tumbleweed Tex-Mex Restaurant. The next stop is The John Hay Center which includes the following: The Steven's Museum, The Pioneer Village, The Birthplace of John Hay, and The Depot Railroad Museum. SHAKER VILLAGE TOUR – June 2,3,4

The Shakers were a religious sect who established a colony in 1805 near Harrodsburg, KY, they called Pleasant Hill. They were a communal society who believed in the second coming of Christ and were celibate. Men and women lived separately so they built many dwellings and other buildings, 34 that still survive today. They lived plain lives and were very skilled craftsmen. Much of their simple furniture is prized today. They died out in 1923 when the last Shaker, Sister Mary Settles, died.

Dennis and Kathy Meyer organized the weekend tour to visit the restored Shaker Village. Others on the trip were Ed & Mary Dathe, Tim & Frieda Howell, Randy Hughey, Mike & Carolyn Kemp, Larry Morlock, John Prohaska & mother-in-law Lula Carley, Phil Sutton, and Larry & Jo Ann Wilcrout.



On Friday, we met just south of Columbus and headed down to Madison, IN, then on US 421 through the scenic hills of Kentucky. Lunch was at the Lawson Family Restaurant in Campbellsburg, KY. After that we were treated to sections of the lovely horse country with many huge horse farms, stables and stately homes.



We arrived at Shaker Village mid-afternoon and had a rude awakening when we discovered how primitive our building was – no elevators, steep stairs, and several stories to navigate. However, our rooms had been well modernized with private baths and TV's and were comfortable. Our building was the East Family Dwelling, built in 1805. Everyone got lots of exercise.

We then had time to relax on the lawn and listen to a live Dixieland Band. It was a very enjoyable interlude with comfortable temperatures, plenty of shade and a gentle breeze.

Dinner was at the Trustee Table Restaurant, which is in one of the larger buildings originally constructed to conduct business by the village trustees. After dinner we enjoyed more music on the lawn.





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On Saturday, breakfast was at the Village Table. The rest of the day was spent learning about the history of the village and just relaxing. We first had a tour to tell us the good parts of the history and how successful the group had been. We then were treated to a demonstration in the Meeting House of how the Shakers sang and danced. It was pretty animated, hence the name of "Shakers." A later tour told us about some of the bad parts of their history and the struggles they had keeping the group together and obeying their doctrine. We also had ample time for more relaxing on the lawn.

Saturday night found us in nearby Harrodsburg at the historic Beaumont Inn, a stately building that was originally built in 1845 as a school for young ladies. We were pleasantly surprised when Roger and Sherryl Goodman showed up to join us for dinner. We had a long and enjoyable dinner, then headed back to the village for the night.

On Sunday morning we had breakfast again at the Village Table, then headed north back toward home. Some of us had lunch on the way back at Stream Cliff Farm near Commiskey and others headed on up the road.

Thanks to Dennis and Kathy for organizing such a great trip. The weather couldn't have been better and the relaxing atmosphere of the old-timey Shaker Village made it a very enjoyable tour.

Bonus fact: The official name used by the Shakers was "The United Society of Believers in Christ's Second Appearing."









Rotary Jail and Strawberry Festival, Crawfordsville, IN

June is known for the large, fast growing strawberries that bear the month's name. And what better way to celebrate the typically bountiful harvest than to have a festival. Crawfordsville has such a festival and Tim and Frieda Howell arranged for a trip to this part of Indiana on Saturday, June 10th. After meeting at the usual spot in Bloomington, we headed north to Crawfordsville to lunch at the Creekside Restaurant. There we had a chance to relax after the drive and catch up with good conversation. Present were Jim and Cathy Dininger, Tim and Freida Howell with friend Butch, John Prohaska with daughter Sami Voils and mother-in-law Lula Carley, Larry Morlock, Tim Ellis with friend Leo Martin, Phil and Marge Sutton, and the author. Once our bellies were full, off to the first stop.

Opened in 1882, the Montgomery County Rotary Jail was the latest design in efficient incarceration of inmates. The two stories of cells are arranged in a circle connected to a single center axis; like slices in a pie. The jailer rotates the entire cell block to align the desired cell to a single opening. This reduces the need for multiple guards managing multiple entrances to each cell. Costs to house inmates was a great concern and this brought these costs down. Additionally, with only one way in and out of the cell block, security was also greatly improved. Our docent, Philip Roach, had an uncle, Sheriff Roy Hardaker, that lived and worked at the jail. Philip was also a police officer and brought his first arrest here, and now volunteers in the museum. The jail was closed in 1973 after being listed as 'unfit for human habitation'.

Next stop was the Crawfordsville Strawberry Festival. Each year, as the warm summer breeze embraces our town, Crawfordsville comes alive with the fragrant aroma of ripe strawberries and the joyful laughter of families and friends. The Strawberry Festival, a beloved tradition that dates back decades, celebrates the arrival of this delightful fruit and showcases the vibrant spirit of our community.

The festival features an array of activities and attractions for visitors of all ages. You can stroll through the bustling farmers' market, where local vendors proudly display their fresh produce, handmade crafts, and delectable treats. Indulge in the taste of summer by savoring mouthwatering strawberry pies, shortcakes, and other delicious strawberry-themed treats.
